EcoAgtube Spotlight on Nawaya: an NGO in Egypt that promotes heritage food systems

<u>Nawaya-Egypt</u> works with small-scale farming families on programmes that focus on ecological farming practices and heritage food systems through a community-based network. It helps rural communities set up enterprises that generate new sources of income for rural communities from making compost to raising poultry and agro-tourism.

Nawaya has also been a video production partner with Access Agriculture, and several farmer-to-farmer training videos have been produced through this partnership on agroecological practices and traditional food processing techniques.

As part of its mission, Nawaya empowers women and youth in rural areas with access to knowledge, markets and appropriate technologies. One of its initiatives is the Nawaya Kitchen Training Centre, which helps women from different villages promote their unique traditional recipes.

During its recent staff meeting in Sakkara, Egypt, the Access Agriculture team was invited by Laura Tabet, Access Agriculture Regional Representative and co-founder of Nawaya-Egypt, to visit the Kitchen Training Centre and sample the magic of the heritage dishes.

Organic biofertilizer in liquid and solid form

For healthy crops you need a healthy soil, because a healthy soil contains many good microbes and earthworms. To prepare biofertilizer for half a hectare, you need 10 kg fresh cow dung, cow urine, flour from chickpeas or another pulse, jaggery or unrefined sugar, and a handful of healthy soil.

ERAs@work!

The following ERAs are part of the project 'Innovation for smallholder resilience' (iNashr) that Access Agriculture is implementing in Egypt, in partnership with the International Center for Agricultural Research in the Dry Areas (ICARDA) and the Agricultural Research Center (ARC) of the Ministry of Agriculture with support from GIZ:

- ERA from **Egypt, Mohamed Hesham**, Projects Manager with Eid Ala Eid Foundation, which works in most governorates in Upper Egypt in agricultural development, has been using innovative facilitation methods to make his video shows interactive and interesting for his target beneficiaries. In one such show in Sakkara, Egypt, where Access Agriculture team was present, Hesham Mohamed shared with the participating men and women farmers relevant photos related to the video topic with explanations and showed them various samples of soils with good micro-organisms. The videos he showed to the participants included <u>soil fertility management practices</u>
- ERA from **Egypt, Samy Daoud**, a field coordinator for the Integral Development Action of Minia (IDAM)'s project, 'Supporting small-scale farmers,' is steadily changing the mindset of the farmers he is working with, to embrace organic farming. For instance, one of his target beneficiaries, Mr. Mohaseb, has adopted the use of vermicompost for his nurseries of carrots. He said he was inspired by

- ERA from **Egypt, Michael Atef**, one of the founders of Women & Community for Development, has been projecting helpful videos regarding <u>good agricultural practices</u>, <u>livestock management</u>. As the price of animal feeds has been rapidly increasing in Egypt, small-scale farmers are searching for better alternatives. That is the reason they were very happy to learn from videos, such as <u>Silage from maize</u>. (See photos in Access Agriculture Facebook)
- ERA from **Egypt, Rashwan Gad El Rab**, who is a co-founder of the NGO Afdal (Better) for Community Development that provide services to vulnerable rural communities, is sharing knowledge of agroecological practices with these communities, using the smart projector. - ERAs from Kenya, Elphas Elkanah Masanga, Christopher Mwazighe, Maureen Njeri Maina and Sylvia Wangui Njonjo, participated in the Kenya ERAs National Meeting with partners (Biovision Africa Trust, PELUM Kenya Association and Sylvia's Basket). The meeting offered them a great opportunity to share experiences and learning on agroecological practices. (See photos in Access Agriculture Facebook)
- ERA from **Zambia, Sussana Phiri**, who is interested in food and nutrition security, especially of young mothers, facilitated a video show session at Mt. Makulu Clinic in Lusaka, Zambia. The videos shown included <u>Making mango crisps</u> and <u>Using sack mounds to grow vegetables</u>. (See photos in Access Agriculture Facebook).

In another video screening session, Sussana showed the videos on <u>Conserving</u> <u>bean leaf vegetables</u>, <u>Using sack mounds to grow vegetables</u> and <u>Enriching</u> <u>porridge with baobab juice</u>. In both the sessions, the videos were shown in Chewa language. (<u>See photos in Access Agriculture Facebook</u>)

• ERA from **Uganda, Martha Kyokuhaire**, Founder and CEO of VFL Gardens. Mukono, Uganda, facilitated a video show session in Mungula II Refugee Settlement, Adjumani District, Itirikwa subcounty in Northern Uganda. The videos included <u>Using sack mounds to grow vegetables</u> and <u>Managing aflatoxins in</u> <u>maize during drying and storage</u>. (See photos in Access Agriculture Facebook).

In another video session held in Lewa Parish, Pakelle Subcounty, Adjumani District, Martha conducted video shows on <u>SLM12 Conservation</u> <u>agriculture, Using sack mounds to grow vegetables, Enriching porridge with</u> <u>baobab juice, Storing fresh and dried tomatoes, Managing aflatoxins in maize</u> <u>during drying and storage</u>. - ERA from **Kenya, Maureen Njeri Maina,** Field Trainer at Schools and Colleges Permaculture (SCOPE) in Kenya, which empowers young people to transform degraded school lands into food forests through agroecology and permaculture practices, helps children and youths from the Thika Child Rescue Centre in Kiambu County, Kenya by showing them videos on how to farm naturally to become food secure. - ERA from **Mali, Aliou Maiga**, who is passionate about organic agriculture held a training session in partnership with UTA / CFBD on agro-food processing, which

was sponsored by GIZ. They were able to train 12 women from Bandiagara, Mali, using the video <u>Tomato concentrate and juice</u> on how tomatoes can be easily processed into concentrate and juice. (<u>See photos in Access Agriculture Facebook</u>)

- ERA from **Malawi, Happy Mbewe**, Field Assistant at the Ministry of Agriculture Irrigation and Water Development, facilitated video screening shows on Human urine as fertilizer, Composting to beat striga, Organic biofertilizer in liquid and solid form and Converting chicken waste into fertilizer (<u>See photos in Access Agriculture Facebook</u>).
- ERA from Rwanda, Benjamin Tuyitegereze, working as a manager at Uruhimbi Kageyo Cooperative (UKC), a youth-led entity committed to providing climate resilient innovation, conducted training sessions using videos on <u>Human urine as</u> <u>fertilizer</u> and <u>Turning honey into money</u> (See photos in Access Agriculture Facebook).
- ERA from Mali, Mamadou Diarra, who is passionate about livestock management, and is the co-founder of an enterprise called Expert Élevage Consulting (EEC SARL), organised a training session on fish farming using the smart projector with participants from Sikasso, Ségou, Baroueli at Guy Bert Centre in Titibougou, Bamako, Mali. Ambassadors in Action

- Access Agriculture Ambassador from **India, Hitul Awasthi,** who runs a digital agriculture platform called "Krishi (Farming) Updates" promoted videos that include <u>Grass strips against soil erosion</u>, <u>Organic biofertilizer in liquid and solid form</u> and <u>Making a vermicompost bed</u>, which greatly benefitted the farmers.
- Access Agriculture Ambassador from Benin, Yolou Mounirou, who is President
 of the NGO Jeunes Ruraux (Rural Youth) of Benin, promoted two videos. The first
 one on <u>Quality cassava planting material</u> was shown to help farmers in the
 Department of Donga in the production of cassava planting material, who
 successfully adopted the technique. The second video <u>Using sack mounds to
 grow vegetables</u> was shown to schoolchildren in the municipality of Ouaké. After
 the screening of the video and the sharing of the factsheet, more than 60%
 students adopted the practice in their homes.

A healthier way to eat groundnuts

Rosario Cadima is an enterprising farmer who spends two days a week buying and selling potatoes at the fair in Colomi, Cochabamba. Juan Almanza, who is an extensionist, had given her a DVD with a series of agricultural learning videos aimed at farmers like her.

The DVD included seven videos in Spanish, Quechua and Aymara on caring for the soil. One of the videos was about peanuts (groundnuts), which like other legumes, fixes nitrogen for the soil. Rosario recently watched the DVD with her parents, grandfather and other family members. They watched all of the videos over three nights, and she recalled them vividly.
